Phrasal Verbs

Get along with (to be friends)

Example: I get along with my sister-in-law extremely well.

Give away (to give something)

Example: I gave away the coat, as it no longer fitted me.

Get on well with (good rapport)

Example: She is getting on well with her mother-in-law

Go through (undergo)

Example: She goes through a hard time now.

Phrasal Verbs

Hive off (to divide off)

Example: He hived off the cream from the milk.

Iron out (to clear out)

Example: They ironed out their differences and became good friends again.

Keep up with (to stay in touch)

Example: They keep up with each other even though they live many miles away.

Look forward to (to expect)

Example: She was looking forward to the arrival of her first grandchild.

Phrasal Verbs

Make fun of (to mock)

Example: Please don't make fun of what she is wearing at office today.

Nod off (doze/nap/snooze)

Example: He nodded off in front of the television.

Own up (admit/confess)

Example: The boy owned up that he had stolen the bar of chocolate.

Pay back (repay/reimburse)

Example: She has paid back the bank loan in full.

Apostrophes

<i>The child's coat</i>	<i>This refers to one coat belonging to one child</i>
<i>The child's coats</i>	<i>This refers to several coats belonging to one child</i>
<i>The children's coats</i>	<i>This refers to the coats of several children</i>
<i>The children's rooms</i>	<i>This refers to the rooms belonging to the children</i>
<i>It's not my favorite film</i>	<i>It's means it is not my favorite film</i>
<i>A hard day's work</i>	<i>This means it was a hard day of working</i>
<i>America's foreign policy</i>	<i>This refers to the foreign policy of America.</i>
<i>Ahmed and Ali's cat</i>	<i>The cat refers to both Ahmed and Ali but only one apostrophe is needed.</i>
