Present Perfect

Have/Has + Past Participle

I/You/We/They (have)
He/She/It (has)

Examples

I have been to France.

She has been to Nepal three times.

I have never been to America.

I think you have seen that movie before.

He has never traveled by train.

Examples

You have grown since the last time I saw you.

The government has become more interested in education.

Dhivehi has become one of the most popular courses at the university since the program was established.

My English has really improved since I moved to Australia.

Examples

Man has walked on the Moon.

Our son has learned how to read.

Doctors have cured many deadly diseases.

Scientists have split the atom.

Examples

Ali has not finished his homework yet.

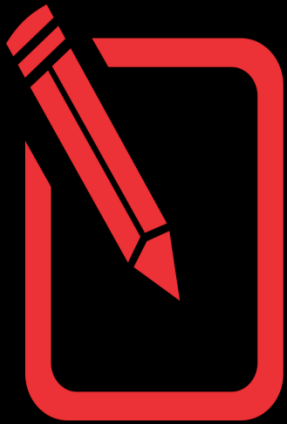
BulBul hasn't mastered Japanese, but she can communicate.

Aisha has still not arrived.

The rain hasn't stopped.

Present Perfect Continuous

Have/Has + been + verb(ing)



Something happening
in the present time
that has been continuing
from the past.

I/You/We/They (have)
He/She/It (has)

You're Awesome.
