# Indefinite Pronouns?

Not specific but preceded by any, some, every or no.

	Person	Place	Thing
All	<b>everyone</b> <b>everybody</b>	<b>everywhere</b>	<b>everything</b>
Part (positive)	<b>someone</b> <b>somebody</b>	<b>somewhere</b>	<b>something</b>
Part (negative)	<b>anyone</b> <b>anybody</b>	<b>anywhere</b>	<b>anything</b>
None	<b>no one</b> <b>nobody</b>	<b>nowhere</b>	<b>nothing</b>

# Examples

<b>Noun</b>	<b>Indefinite pronoun</b>
<b>I would like to go to Paris this summer.</b>	<b>I would like to go somewhere this summer.</b>
<b>Ali gave me this book.</b>	<b>Someone gave me this book.</b>
<b>I won't tell your secret to Aisha.</b>	<b>I won't tell your secret to anyone.</b>
<b>I bought my school supplies at the mall.</b>	<b>I bought everything at the mall.</b>

# Affirmative

**Some - indefinite quantity**

**Every – complete quantity**

**No – an absence**

**“ Indefinite pronouns with *no* are often used in affirmative sentences with a negative meaning, but these are nevertheless not negative sentences because they are lacking the word *not*.”**

# Examples

**Everyone** is sleeping in my bed.

**Someone** is sleeping in my bed.

**No one** is sleeping in my bed.

I gave **everything** to Hucen.

He saw **something** in the garden.

There is **nothing** to eat.

I looked **everywhere** for my keys.

Mariyam is looking for **somewhere** to live.

There is **nowhere** as beautiful as Foakaidhoo.

# “Any” close to Every

## Examples

They can choose **anything** from the menu.

You may invite **anybody** you want to your birthday party.

We can go **anywhere** you'd like this summer.

He'd give **anything** to get into Oxford.

Nisha would follow you **anywhere**.

# Negative Sentences

Negative sentences can only be formed with “*any*”.

## Examples

I don't have **anything** to eat.

She didn't go **anywhere** last week.

I can't find **anyone** to come with me.



“Can turn into  
affirmative”

## Negative Sentences

I don't know **anything** about it. = **neutral**

I know **nothing** about it. = **defensive**

I don't have **anybody** to talk to. = **neutral**

I have **nobody** to talk to. = **hopeless**

There wasn't **anything** we could do. = **neutral**

There was **nothing** we could do. = **defensive/angry**

# Negative Questions??

Indefinite pronouns with *every*, *some*, and *any* can be used to form negative questions. These questions can usually be answered with a "yes" or a "no"

Is there **anything** to eat?

Did you go **anywhere** last night?

Is **everyone** here?

Have you looked **everywhere**?

Isn't there **anything** to eat?  
Didn't you go **anywhere** last night?  
Isn't **everyone** here?  
Haven't you looked **everywhere**?

Are you looking for **someone**?  
Have you lost **something**?  
Are you going **somewhere**?  
Could **somebody** help me, please? = **request**  
Would you like to go **somewhere** this weekend? = **invitation**

Aren't you looking for **someone**?  
Haven't you lost **something**?  
Aren't you going **somewhere**?  
Couldn't **somebody** help me, please?  
Wouldn't you like to go **somewhere** this weekend?
